Dear Interested Party,

The Grants Pass Field Office is preparing an Environmental Assessment (EA). The EA will document potential effects of the Cold Elk Forest Management Project within policies set forth in the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The planning area is located within the West Fork Cow Creek Watershed, in Coos and Douglas Counties, Oregon. The legal description of the planning area includes sections within Township 31 South, Range 8 West; Township 32 South, Range 8 West; Township 31 South, Range 9 West; Township 32 South, Range 9 West; and Township 32 South, Range 10 West. You have been contacted because you live within approximately one half mile of the planning area, or you have requested to receive planning updates from the Grants Pass Field Office.

Project activities are being considered in the Land Use Allocations designated as Matrix and Riparian Reserves, under the 1994 Medford District Resource Management Plan/1995 Record of Decision (RMP/ROD). The objectives of the project are to:

- Improve the health of the forest and associated habitats, to reduce tree mortality, and to restore the vigor, resiliency and stability of forest stands that are necessary to meet land use allocation objectives (RMP, p. 62);
- Manage timber stands to reduce the risk of stand loss from wildfires, animals, insects and diseases (RMP, p. 72);
- Produce a sustainable supply of timber and other forest commodities to provide jobs and contribute to economic sustainability in the Matrix LUA (RMP, p.38);
- Maintain or restore the components of the Aquatic Conservation Strategy in Riparian Reserves (RMP, p. 22);
- Develop and maintain a transportation system that serves the needs of users in an environmentally sound manner (RMP, p. 84);
- Manage and design road systems that reduce hazards to public health and safety, fire risks, and vandalism to public and private property (RMP, p. 88); and
- Maintain haul roads to accommodate the safe movement of vehicles and machines (Oregon OSHA Chapter 437, Division 7, Section F.

Potential treatments include variable density thinning, understory reduction and roadside treatments. Forest types being considered for treatment include mixed conifer stands ranging from 40 to 250 years old. Harvest operations needed to accomplish the project objectives would include tractor, cable and helicopter logging. Existing roads would be utilized where possible, and new road construction may be proposed to access harvest units.

There are a variety of natural resources in the planning area. The interdisciplinary team, consisting of resource professionals, will work to reduce adverse effects to resources. Resource concerns within the planning area may include, but are not limited to managing for listed species and critical habitat for: northern spotted owl, marbled murrelet, and Oregon Coast coho salmon.
